

The lodging and meetings were at the King and Prince Beach and Golf Resort. The Resort was originally opened in 1935 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. 

On the way back from Jekyll Island, pictures were taken of a fishing troller, an English flat bottom boat and a moored sailing ship. The flat bottom boats are seen on the rivers of the English countryside.

On Saturday afternoon after the Chapter Round Table and Board meeting, everyone boarded vintage trolleys for a tour of St Simons Island. The English claimed the territory and established a town on the banks in 1736. One of the stops was Christ Church, Frederica. Considered one of St Simon's most treasured landmarks, this is the church where John and Charles Wesley (considered fathers of Methodism) conducted services in 1747. The first church structure was built in 1820, but was destroyed by Union troops during the Civil War. The present church was built in 1884. The oldest grave stone discovered in the church yard dates from 1803.

This only scratches the surface of another great weekend of great food, fellowship and site seeing events compliments of Bill and Gail Turner and the Blue Ridge Chapter of ACBS.



RESULTS OF ACBS SURVEY

Incoming ACBS President, Bob Bush directed a survey to be sent out in December, 2006. He feels that it is very important to keep a close relationship between ACBS and the individual chapters. The results of the survey were shared with the directors present at St



Simons. An overview of the survey is included here. A more detailed analysis will be put into the Spring Rudder. Hopefully you had a chance to complete the survey. Bob McMahn, ACBS Director, in charge of the Public Relations & Marketing Comittee, provided this summary for the board meeting. I will share more information with you at the Spring membership Friday Fish Fry, Delafield Brewhaus, April 6th, 2007

BACKGROUND: As the Survey questions were being developed, the PR Committee solicited input from thirteen Board Members whose responsibilities are allied with ACBS membership at large interests and actions. In the end, it was determined that a sampling of the members would be surveyed utilizing those members that have provided email addresses with their registration. The electronic format provided for instant response and tabulation and also provided the maximum time for review and return of the Survey.

The first flight of 5600 Surveys was emailed on December 12th and the Survey was concluded on December 22nd. Half way through this time period a reminder was sent out to those that had not responded.



CONCLUSIONS:

- The Executive Summary prepared by the Research Firm along with all the raw data used to make up the Summary has been presented to the ACBS Executive Committee for their review and conclusion.
- Following are a few summary conclusions and facts.
- 5600 Surveys emailed. Thirteen percent or 728 bounced back for whatever reason. 1520 were received by the recipients.
- Thus we sampled 19% of our members (1520/8000) and we had a 27% return on the 5600 we sent out. This is an excellent response by all statistical measures! We can assume the measures we calculate are representative of our full membership of 8000.
- This Survey cuts across our membership and provides our members thoughts as regards their membership in ACBS International.
- 78% of respondents have never been a Chapter Officer
- Age of respondents
- 65+ 24.5%
- 55-64 38.3%
- 45-54 26.4%
- 35-44 8.9%
- 18-34 1.5%

Interesting fact, we're not as old as we think we are. 64% of our members are aged between 45 and 64.

- Geographic: Four Canadian Providences, Forty-seven U.S. States and the District of Columbia represented in the Survey.
- Tenure in ACBS: •1 year or less 14.8% 2-5 years 35.5% 6-9 years 21.3% 10 year or more 28.3% Notice how well this tenure splits, 50.3% five years or less and 49.6% six years or more.
- Chapter members versus non-chapter members: 88.2 % versus 11.8%
- Number of boats owned and number that are fiberglass:
 97% of members own a boat
 About half of these boat owners own 2-5 boats
 20% of the boats owned are Fiberglass
- Willingness to participate in a judged boat show. 52% said they were, 25% said no and the balance had no opinion
- Two Track Judging System: 64 % are in favor, 6% are not and 30% had no opinion
- There were a number of questions that dealt with membership benefits, member attendance at International events and what are the expectations of the members. The Committee is reserving comment on these questions at this time. We (PR committee) believe the Executive Board should have time to absorb the Executive Summary Report and supporting data and then they should provide comments on these issues. This said, the PR committee provided the following comment.
- Only 25% of ACBS International Members have attended an Annual or Quarterly Meeting.
- The Survey comes through loud and clear suggesting that many of our members perceive International (headquarters) as being another part of ACBS that has little or nothing to do with ACBS at the Chapter level. These members appear to have little or no interest in what goes on at the International level. Their interests lie in the local Chapters and the events they can participate in that are close to home.


